LPVRS Middle Interceptor Project

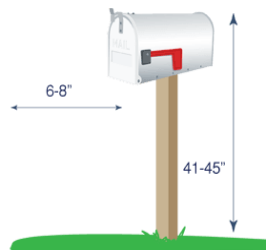
The Lower Perkiomen Valley Regional Sewer Authority (LPVRS) is beginning the last component needed for the PA DEP approved Regional ACT 537 Plan. The last component of this plan to be implemented is to construct a parallel and replace the Middle Interceptor. This project is expected to take two years to complete.

Three of the five construction entrances are located in the Township; Route 29 near Hopwood Road, Arcola Road, and Lower Indian Head Road. Other entrances outside of the Township include First Avenue from Chestnut Street Extension in Collegeville Borough and Yerkes Road in Lower Providence. The construction is located outside of the roadway so there will be a lesser impact on traffic for the general public.

The Perkiomen Trail will also be temporarily impacted intermittently throughout the two-year project. Sections of the trail will be used for temporary pump piping. The piping will be located on the edge of the trail and will be protected by a fence. The piping will remain on the trail for six months south of the Cider Mill Road Crossing. ♦

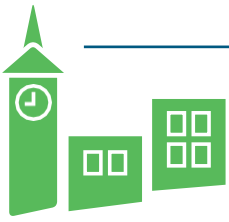
Winter Mailbox Tips

To prevent your driveway from being plowed in, pile the snow to the right, not the left, of the driveway. Please note, all State Roads are maintained by PennDOT. ♦



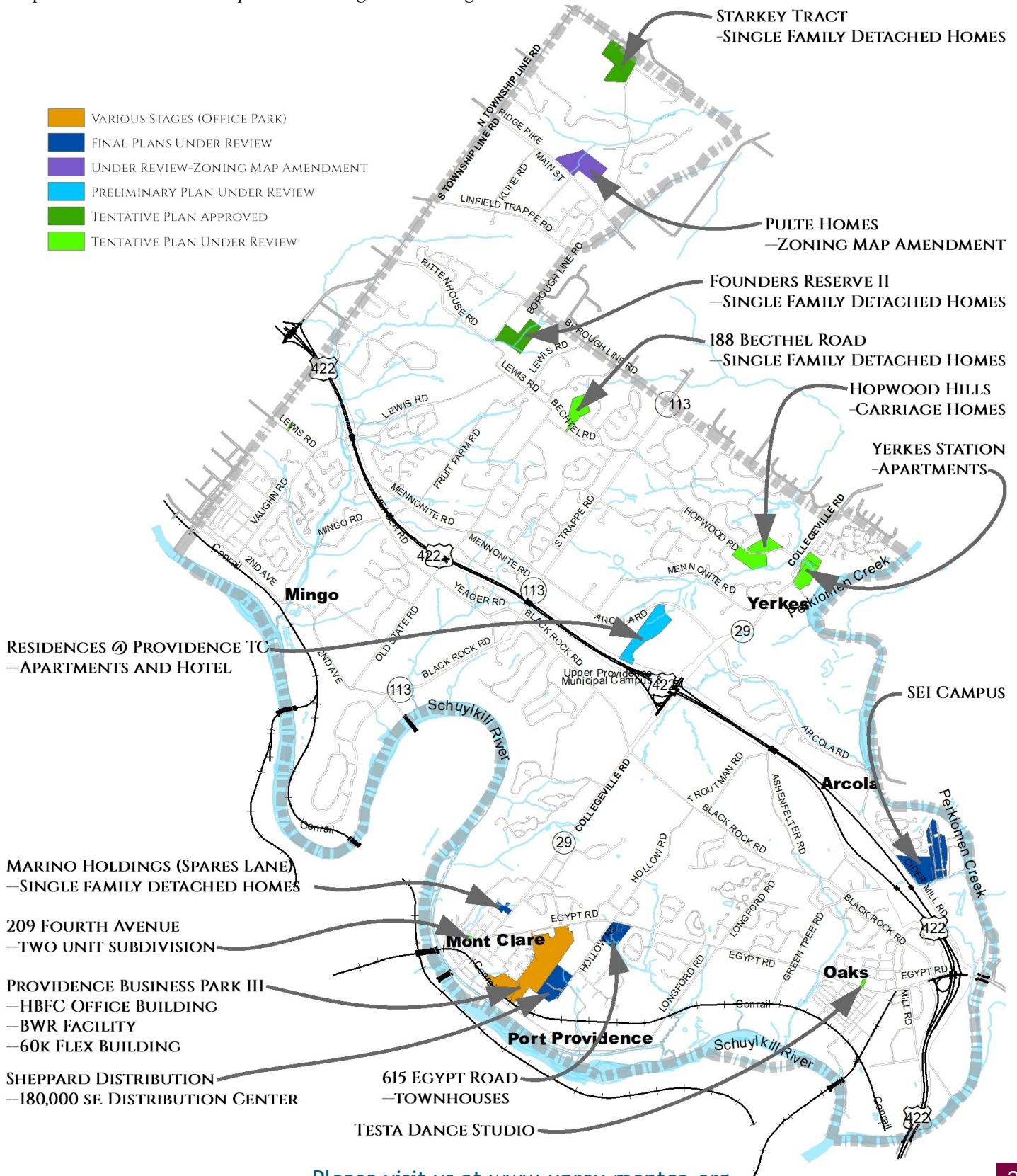

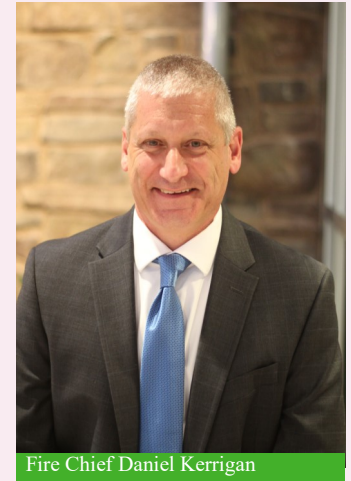

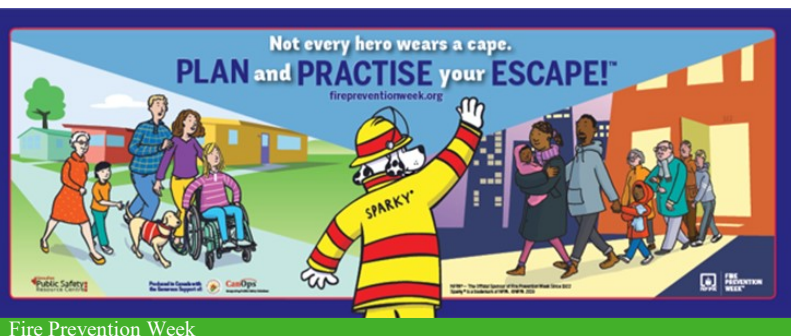
UPT Welcomes New Fire Chief

(Continued from Page 1) Did you know that three out of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no working smoke alarms? During fire prevention month, fire departments educate their communities, and encourage parents and loved ones to practice fire safety and whole home safety. This year's fire prevention theme is "Not Every Hero Wears A Cape". In a fire or other emergency seconds count! As your local Fire Department we would like to offer you the following tips:

1. Plan an escape route.
2. Practice home fire drills.
3. Test your smoke alarms on a monthly basis to ensure that they function.
4. Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms every six months or based upon manufacturer recommendations; many smoke

alarms now have ten year sealed batteries.

5. Ensure that you have a minimum of one smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarm on every level of your home. Ideally you should also have one in each bedroom / near all sleeping areas; carbon monoxide is the number one cause of accidental deaths.
6. Choose an outside meeting place so that your family knows where to go once they evacuate.
7. Make sure all members of your family understand how to call 9-1-1 and summon emergency responders in the event of an emergency. ❖

Halloween Safety Tips

- Go Trick-Or-Treating with an adult.
- Wear a costume that lets you see and hear perfectly.
- Make sure your costume fits so you don't trip over it.
- Visit only places you know.
- Take a flashlight with you.
- Have a trusted adult check your candy.

Fall Driving Tips

- Wet leaves, fog, sun glare and frost are a few driving hazards we will encounter this fall. Wet leaves on the roadway can be as slippery as ice and can obscure pavement lines and markings. Motorists should slow down and use extra caution on leaf-covered roads. 
- Motorists should use low beam headlights when driving in fog. High beams can create glare and reduce visibility. State law requires headlights to be on when wipers are in use.
- Sun glare can be problematic during sunrise and sunset, which coincides with morning and evening rush hours. The intense sun glare may blind a driver, causing an unexpected traffic slowdown. Drivers can prepare for the glare by keeping a set of sunglasses handy, removing clutter from their sun visors and keeping the inside of their vehicle's windshield clean. Morning frost and icy spots on the road can also cause problems as overnight temperatures drop toward freezing.
- Motorists should pay particular attention to bridges, overpasses and shaded areas on roadways where icy spots can form on the pavement. In addition to exercising caution while driving, motorists should clear their vehicles' windows of frost before travel. ♦

The Social Security Advisory Board typically does not contact the general public to request personal information over the phone. As a reminder, **never** give your personal information or money over the phone.
