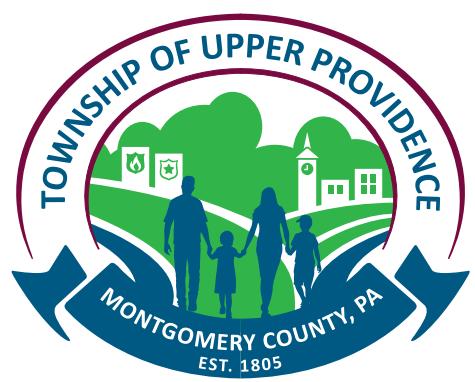

## Fire Prevention

Each year fire departments across the U.S. respond to fires that destroy property, cause numerous injuries, and result in fatalities. According to a 2018 National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) report, fire loss estimates are believed to be \$25.6 billion dollars in property damage, along with 15,200 civilian fire injuries and 3,655 civilian fire deaths. Fire Prevention Week traditionally occurs early in October. This is due to the great Chicago fire that started on October 8, 1871 and burned until October 10<sup>th</sup>. This devastating fire is said to have left approximately 300 dead and caused around \$200 million dollars in damages. *(continued on Page 4)*

# Police

## Re-Accreditation



According to the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission, Pennsylvania State Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of assisting institutions assess and improve their overall performance. The foundation of this strategy lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives.

Participating administrators then conduct a thorough examination to determine how existing operations are modified to meet these objectives. When the procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals are assigned to verify that all relevant standards have been successfully implemented. The process concludes with a decision by the Commission that the institution is worthy of accreditation status. In September of 2017, Upper Providence Township Police

earned our first accreditation status from the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. Accreditation status is valid for 3-years, then each agency must obtain re-accreditation.

On September 3, 2020, three assessors from the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission arrived to conduct an on-site review and re-assessment of our department. The review consisted of examining 3-years of proofs of compliance, inspecting files and equipment, interviewing department personnel and conducting ride-a-longs with patrol officers.

At the conclusion of their on-site assessment, all three assessors praised our agency and communicated that they would be recommending to the Commission in their report that we be re-accredited for an additional three years. The Commission meets later this year to officially review all recommendations and to vote. ♦

## Catfishing in the Schuylkill



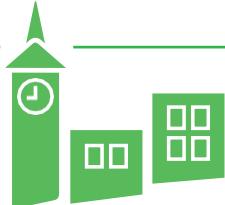
On the evening of Friday, September 4<sup>th</sup>, Nolan Sheaffer (13 years old, Royersford) with the help

# Fire and Emergency Services

(continued from Page 1) As a result of this fire, the rebuilding process involved many steps including new laws that required buildings to be built with fireproof materials. Although many of you may be familiar with fire service efforts to raise awareness during Fire Prevention Week, many fire departments commit increased resources to fire prevention and public education on a year-round basis.

This year, Fire Prevention efforts will look a little different than we are all accustomed to seeing. Departments across the country are rethinking their approach and delivery of our safety messages to you, our community members. We want you to know that we are working hard to develop new and interactive ways to reach out and deliver those messages to all of you consistently and effectively. One new initiative we are excited about is the development and production of several fire safety videos that we will be able to share across many platforms. Equally exciting is the formation of a Regional Community Risk Reduction Task Force comprised of representatives of several area fire departments. As this team develops, we will be better able to pool resources, share responsibilities, and ultimately deliver an even higher level of education and fire prevention to the entire region.

The fire prevention theme for 2020 is: Serve up Fire Safety in the Kitchen. Unattended cooking continues to be the leading cause of residential fires. We want to remind everyone to remain vigilant while cooking to prevent any disasters by refreshing on these basic kitchen fire safety tips:

1. First and foremost, in the event of a fire, the best advice is to evacuate. Once safely outside, call 9-1-1 to report the emergency.
2. Be sure your cooking area has plenty of space so that combustible items are not close to the stove/oven.
3. Never use water to extinguish a grease fire. Sliding the lid over the pan or pot will help contain and extinguish a fire.
4. If you discover a fire in your oven, turn off the oven, keep the door closed, and call 9-1-1.
5. When children are nearby, please use the 3-foot rule: Children should maintain a 3-foot distance from all cooking appliances to prevent burn injuries.

Here are some additional tips from the NFPA :

### STAY focused on the food

Unattended cooking is the leading cause of fires in the kitchen.

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. Turn off the burner if you leave the kitchen—even for a short period of time.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly and stay in the home.
- Use a timer to remind you that you are cooking, or carry around a wooden spoon as a reminder.
- If you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, or have taken medicine that makes you drowsy, don't cook. Place a delivery order!



### PUT a lid on it

You can take simple steps to keep a small kitchen fire from getting out of control.

- Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it's cool.
- Never discharge a portable fire extinguisher into a grease fire because it will spread the fire.
- In case of an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed until the oven is cool. After the fire, have the oven serviced before using it again.
- If you have a microwave oven fire, turn the appliance off immediately and keep the oven door closed. Have the microwave oven serviced before using it again.

### KEEP cooking areas clear

Clear away clutter and give cooking appliances space to lessen the chance of a kitchen fire.

- Keep anything that can catch fire—oven mitts, wooden utensils, food wrappers, towels, curtains—away from the stovetop.
- Loose clothing can hang down onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- Keep pets off cooking surfaces and nearby countertops.
- Clean up food and grease from burners and the stovetop.



### PREVENT scalds and burns

Hot liquids and steam from the stove or oven can cause devastating injuries.

- Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge.
- Keep hot foods and liquids away from table and counter edges.
- Keep your face away from the oven door when checking or removing food so that the heat or steam does not cause burns.
- Open microwaved food slowly, away from your face. Let food cool before eating.
- Keep appliance cords coiled and away from counter edges.

## Hess Preserve Parking Project



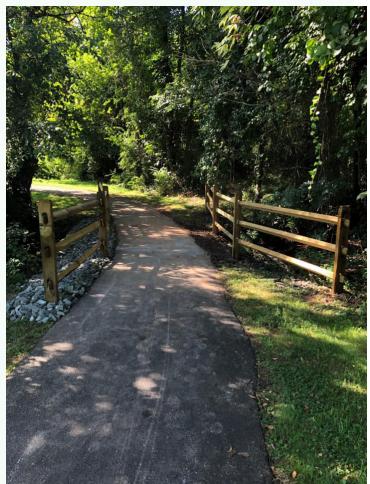
